Take Care (Part One)

February 29, 2004

Officers, Ladies & Gentlemen,

I wish to thank you for letting me serve you as your Chairman for the next two years. I think it is fair for you to have a bit of my background as it pertains to our 18th c. life and also see what I wish to strive for.

I got involved at the tail end of the Bicentennial, 1980. I participated in Cowpens, Guilford Courthouse, Yorktown and the famous Paris trip. I was weaned under the command of Bill Brown of the 1st MD and Tom Deakin of the 1st VA, both organizers and movers and shakers in this community in its formative years. The First Maryland was one of the creators of the Corps of the Continental Line and the First Virginia was instrumental in making Yorktown 1981 happen. Both Bill and Tom were subject of much criticism and scorn as they both had successful units and they both helped the hobby move forward in ways that may not have happened for many years. They were not in this for a popularity contest as they were to get things done. I have had people say a lot of less than flattering things about me and I find comfort in knowing that I am in good company. Frankly, if this weren't the case I'd think that I wasn't getting anything done.

I have served in Line & Rifles. I have sponged a cannon or two on land as well as onboard the USF Constellation & HMS Victory. I have taken some time learning about the mounted troops. Fortunately I have managed to stay in the saddle more than out. Having edited a video or two I have taken the opportunity to look at this avocation of ours in painstaking detail. I am a member of the Sons of the American Revolution (Chapter President), Sons of the Revolution (State Secretary), and Society of the Cincinnati. I plan to bring my re-enacting/history to these groups, as many need some help after I hang up my musket. I have slept in Patrick Henry's house and on grounds in much more austere settings.

I have organized an event or two and developed a "cookbook" to help anyone with too much time on their hands wishing to do the same. My theory is: "I am having a party with 1,000 of my best friends and they all have guns!" That raises the bar doesn't it?

I am a product of a mixed marriage: my Father's from Virginia and my Mother is from Rhode Island. I am a Yankee and/or Corn-fed depending which side of the Potowmack River I find myself. I am proud of both names as it allows me a unique position to appreciate both points of view. Was it the "War to save the Republic" or "War of Northern Aggression"?

With all that being said and you have a better understanding of where I come from; you can better understand what I hope to promote during my term:

1. As it relates to the 225th, the war in North has historically reached a stalemate and it has been a while for the Southern Department to offer events that are worthy of your time. We down in the land south of the Potowmack call this the Southern Campaign.

 2005 May Charleston, SC
 2006 January (MLK weekend) Cowpens, SC
 March Guilford Cthse, NC
 October (4 day) Yorktown, VA

- 2. I understand units are sovereign. The Continental Line will not run units and does not run events. We are like a confederation with a gentlemen's agreement to work together for the common good. As such I will work for that common good.
- 3. I expect Liaisons, Representatives & Department Coordinators to wear many hats. These hats are they are:

- Members of units
- Represent units within the departments and the Line.
- Facilitators to communicate regional and national issues
- Recruiters of Units
- Promoters of Events and how CL works

Item 2 and 3 may seem at odds at times but they are very much working for the common good of the Line and the community of re-enactors that we make up.

- 4. Strengthen CL in dealing with other umbrellas: I have already started a dialog thru the liaisons of the BAR and BB. This has already proved very beneficial. I have also started direct talks with the BAR and BB leaders themselves. I look forward to working with them and making events worthy of your time, talents and monies.
- 5. I wish to see a growth in the units.... Not the number of the units in the Continental Line, but the numbers within the existing units and the quality of the same. I will forward the organizational papers to the *Corps of the Continental Line* for the next Soldier and you will see that their goal was to have strong units working together. The *Corps* was made up of 3 units (1st MD, 2nd PA and 9th VA) and fielded 3 cannon and up to 200 muskets at any event. In unit size and strength I see familiarity and safety in working together.
- 6. I want to foster a better understanding between the various services: line, rifles, lights, dragoons, artillery and better appreciation of what scope of Continentals, States, Militia and French. This can be done in part thru white papers written by the leaders within their service and published in the Soldier. In understanding the role of these organizations, we better utilize them, keep people happy and give a better presentation to the public. Dismounted Dragoons do not do the same thing as Light troops, Militia performed differently in various parts of the war, and safe operation of Artillery is certainly of interest to us all.
- 7. When we started out some 17 years ago, we had a small group of officers and as such we communicated with each other often and on any subject. As we have grown, it is more difficult if not impossible to do this today. I am looking to have this e-list for unit officers that will allow us to discuss things that are pertinent to the Line, our units, and events. Presently there are 70 some units in the Line. Therefore this e-list will only be 70 some people on this list so we are not as busy with all the input as some other lists. It will allow us to address issues quickly and in a secured fashion. If this sounds elitist to some, I'm sorry, it is to help information move quickly when it has to.
- 8. I want to see that we have a culture at events that security and safety are assumed. Authenticity and education is not a problem. Yet, there have been recent instances where respect for private property has been violated. If this is allowed to go on unchecked the once peaceful "Camelot" that we use to inhabit will slip into a less desirable atmosphere and we will loose participants thanks to a very few.

9. HAVE LOTS OF FUN!!!!

Again, it is a privilege to serve you and I will do my best to deserve this honor.

Fellow Compatriots and Patriots,

When I was given the opportunity to serve you at the last meeting in Allentown, we had a schedule of some outstanding events for 2004 and the promise of some great 225th events in the upcoming years. This is what makes me enjoy this so much.

I also adopted some problems that had not been cleared up. Some got cleared, some cleared themselves up and one remains a work in progress. They all dealt with the sanctity of personal property. As we attend events, we have nothing more than a thin layer of canvas and our word that protects ourselves from each other. There is a camper's credo that you don't mess with another's gear cause they can mess with yours. When the Continental Line started a mere 18 years ago, we got together on the premise of we wanted to get like-minded units together to portray the Continental army and put on larger shows. Most of us were vets of the Bicentennial and knew what it was like to do large events and field large numbers of troops. We also know that these "mini-cities" bring with them some problems of logistics and such, but misbehavior is not acceptable, period as it betrays our trust. I pray we haven't let a less savory group creep into our organization. Time will tell. I rather think that these misdeeds have been not so much the result of premeditation or malicious intent, but more practical jokes that have not been thought out and have gone bad. I am very much for having fun and good jokes like the snowball attack on Paul Hutchins at Monmouth and the talent show at Newtown.

I will get off the pulpit and get to more enjoyable task of highlighting some events of note and looking to the future. I regret I missed you at Sutton, but my son was in the midst of an emergency at college and he need a hand from dear ol' Dad. HEY! How many time will I get to be a hero to a 20 year-old son. And when Quebec came, well, we had some Southern boys (and girls) make the trek and cross the boarder. I made the Newtown event and had the honor of participating in the retiring of the 1st NY DeWitt's Coy. After serving on Knox's gun I have a lot more respect for luggin' that puppy up hills than I did before. We were the pilot for a new reality show called "Cardiac Arrest". More fun than any daytime activity was the fantastic camaraderie (someone tell me fellowship sounds too much like a church gathering) Friday evening upon arrival, the wedding and subsequent talent show.... I don't think I said that right. You who were there know what I mean and the rest of you will just have to wonder what they missed. Savannah was a Great event and I am sorry for those who missed this event. It's the most fun I've had in mud in years. If anyone wanted to shoot more, they can't ever be satisfied. Thanks to our efforts there, the original Spring Hill Redoubt is being reclaimed as we speak with a \$6m grant. Well Done!

The Continental Line has been recognized by the National Society of the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR). Former Chairman Jim Garner and Vince Hawkins of the First Virginia received the Bronze Good Citizenship Award from the DC Society for their outstanding work. I wrote an article about the Continental Line for the SAR magazine, which is to be out by the spring edition.

I attended the 114th Congress of the SAR held in Pittsburgh, PA this past 4th of July week and among the activities I participated in, I attended meetings of the 225th Celebrations Committee,

W3R Committee, and Historic Celebrations Committee. I established contacts and as these committees do have overlap, they afford coverage that we will not be forgotten in efforts and exposure. Can you say benefactors? I also had the opportunity to have lunch with some folks looking to join the Continental Line and I think we will be seeing them shortly.

This past April Chip Gnam, CO of the First Virginia and I attended the Washington Rochambeau Revolutionary Route (W3R) meeting held at the national HQ of the Daughters of the American Revolution. In a nutshell we established contacts with that organization which will be hosting events from Rhode Island to Virginia from 2005 to 2006. The forces of the King of France will be in much demand and I can see these guys are going to be tire troopers by Yorktown. As a result of the meeting, I was contacted by parties for the ground braking of the Freedom Towers on the 4th of July. Regrettably, government moves very slowly.

Looking forward to the 2005 Campaign, we have a great slate of opportunities not only for 225th events, but some others as well. I will allow the Department Coordinators to report on the events, but I will bring the spotlight on one of those "other" events. Mount Vernon has completed a new visitor where a video of George Washington's life will be shown to visitors. The storyboard for the shoot is to include Braddock's Defeat, Trenton and Yorktown. Filming is to take place in Feb, April and May. I very strongly recommend you check out the website for casting: www.fatherofhiscountry.com They are looking for 500 re-enactors. The Director is Ron Maxwell of "Gods and Generals" & "Gettysburg". Oh! did I say that you will be paid? Check it out! ©

As many of you are aware, my family recently suffered the loss of our Betsy. There is nothing in life that can prepare you for such a tragedy, and we wish to thank all of you who have been so very kind in showing your support in your cards, letters, & flowers. For this we are truly grateful and blessed. Your support is greatly appreciated. Betsy was a re-enactor during the Bicentennial and would have enjoyed getting to know all of you, as you would have enjoyed getting to know her. I am dedicating my efforts in this hobby to something we all loved for so many years.

We successfully put on an event at Savannah the likes they have not seen for many decades. Because of your efforts, the city of Savannah secured a \$6million grant to restore the Spring Hill Redoubt to its appearance in 1779. The weather did not dampen the spirits of those who travel to a land far far away. Artillery reported shooting over 500 rounds that weekend and many a cartridge box ran out before the charge upon the redoubt. The City of Savannah, as well as the Georgia Historic Foundation wishes that I extend my most sincere thanks to all who helped and attended this event. The event for Charleston, is finally coming together, we have not only a fine site that is reenactor experienced as well as reenactor friendly, but they even have dug 300 yards of trench works and are going to dig the advances and parallels for the siege and fall of Charleston. That plus a stand up battle on an open field, as well as a little swamp fight. Heck we are event talking with the host about a night walk where everyone gets to "play in the earthworks" at night just as it was done.

Cowpens is shaping up to be a real show in 2006, with the encampment on the original site. We also plan a small local event for the Beauford's Massacre in the Waxhaws with a ceremony on the original site at the original time with the 225-year offset. This is again a reasonably small event, but anyone whose unit was involved is certainly invited. The Guilford information is not firmed up yet, but I hope to be able to present it better at the meeting in Annapolis.

We also plan to present another Artillery unit for membership at the meeting. See you there, hopefully with another hospitality suite for the Southern Campaign.

Proposals for Consideration

1. Authenticity Guidelines

While it's my understanding that the Continental Line has a policy of not endorsing authenticity "regulations," (which I agree with) I suggest that the Line provide some basic authenticity guidelines. The CL has some of the best units in the hobby, and it's natural that individuals, and new units, look to the Line for this kind of information. With the many talented individuals among the membership, I think the Line is missing an important opportunity to provide some real help to the hobby.

These guidelines would be intended to provide helpful research information to individuals, as well as new units, covering such re-enactor basics as original source documents, research suggestions, correct fabrics and patterns, etc. These guidelines should be put together and reviewed with the help of volunteers from the Line, including people like Henry Cooke, as well as outside "experts," so that the information can be considered relatively "state of the art." The material can be assembled and perhaps posted on the web site, or provided in printed form.

This would be something of an ongoing effort since our research is never really finished. Providing this kind of useful information will also go a long way toward improving the hobby and guaranteeing that authenticity "regulations" are generally not needed.

2. Drill Guidelines

Similar to the authenticity guidelines, this idea is to find a group of interested volunteers to assemble a set of drill instructions for use of the Line at our events. The Line has done a great job of assembling all of our units into authentically sized battalions at large events. And we are all fairly well versed in the basic musket manual and platoon maneuvers, but we frequently struggle when we try any complicated battalion drill. These guidelines would be used to standardize and distribute the larger drill maneuvers to be used when we're assembled in large formations.

I have seen some printed material that's been put together by the Line, and I know that individuals like Paul Hutchins, and others, have done a great job of pushing this kind of drill. I'd like to see the effort taken a little further, and include more individuals in the effort, so that we can really begin to learn and use some of these more complicated maneuvers at our events. I also think this will require a commitment from most of the units in the Line to be willing to participate in this effort, but I also think that once we start to make this effort together, we'll wonder why we didn't do this before now.

The first thing needed for both of these proposals is to find individuals among the Line who want to help with either, or both, of these ideas. Flying Camp

Gentlemen:

We are sure that you all have seen over the past few years that small groups of individuals have been opting to forego the use of heavy camp equipment, tents and encamp along the wood lines. They sometimes will make brush huts, lean-tos and dig small field kitchens when allowed. We were wondering if there is a way that this could be done on a more organized / centralized way at events as a type of "flying camp?"

This camp would be used by interested individuals as an area to cook and sleep in while exchanging ideas and expanding their knowledge of the life of a continental soldier. The men would return to their individual units for all drill, tactical, and other unit activities. This group of individuals will not field as a unit, so man power will not be taken away from the member units of the CL.

The camp could be located in such a place that would allow the public and other troops to visit and learn from. This camp is not meant to take away from the main camp only to add a new facet of the experience for our members and the public. The camp could also demonstrate how the army camped without the use of tents and such, which they had to do many times as the wagons were far to the rear for protection.

This would not be a requirement at an event, as many sites are very tight on space, rather it would only be a request for sponsoring units to set aside an area during their planning of the events if space allows. At events folks usually look for an area to use on their own, they also ask the host unit if it is ok to dig a smaller version of the field kitchen. If the host unit will allow this before the event then an area can be set aside for the "flying camp", when people register they could be directed to this camp site if they are so inclined.

What do you think of this concept? How should this be presented to future event host units? Again the "flying camp" is already being done at events in different locations. We are only looking to organize a single area at events where like minded individuals can go and exchange ideas to expand their knowledge for the benefit of all.

Please let us know your thoughts about the concept and how to proceed if you are supportive of this measure.

1. Ideally, we'd like a picture of you in uniform and/or period civilian clothing, as well as a "headshot" photo that shows what your face looks like. This be either a modern or period picture, either would be great.

We're still casting some roles of look-alikes for famous personages, so knowing what you look like is crucial. However, slots are filling up FAST, so get your data in ASAP if you're interested, please.

- 2. There are still slots available in the military core group for the Winter Shoot, but that's also filling up fast if you're interested please get your info in. The primary "core group" will be young guys -- who can pass for 18-30, slim & soldierly looking. As so many of the really good reenactors out there are fellow Baby Boomers or older Gen-X'ers, a young core group will help to bring the average age of the guys on the field down a bit.
- 3. We need 150 Hessians for the Battle of Trenton scenes. As you all know, there AREN'T that many Hessian reenactors in the whole hobby. If you're interested in "galvanizing" Hessian we'd like to hear from you, as we pursue various strategies, in conjunction with the Wardrobe dept, to round up the necessary gear. Savannah takes search for Revolutionary War remnants high-tech

SAVANNAH--Dragging radar equipment behind a John Deere tractor, scientists recently scanned the site of Savannah's bloody Revolutionary War battle for buried remnants of the 1779 siege.

Local historians hope the virtual excavation will reveal trenches and earthen fortifications used by British troops to fend off an allied force of French soldiers and Colonial militiamen who tried to reclaim the city 225 years ago.

Often overshadowed in the South by the Civil War, the American Revolution left a bloody legacy in coastal Georgia.

The city and the nonprofit Coastal Heritage Society are developing 9.5 acres of the battlefield into a park, located on Savannah's western edge where Interstate 16 ends in the downtown historic district.

They hope the survey gives them a more precise picture of where the British placed fortifications that allowed them to win the second-most lopsided victory of the revolution, after Bunker Hill.

"It all happened in 55 minutes. And every minute, five to eight people are being killed on the average," said Scott Smith, director of the Coastal Heritage Society.

As many as 5,000 French troops arrived at Savannah in September 1779 to join roughly 2,000 Colonists seeking to take back the city, which had been seized by the British the previous year.

On Oct. 9, the allies charged British fortifications and were gunned down in five waves. About 300 died on the spot, and hundreds more were mortally wounded.

Savannah historians have a general idea of the battlefield's layout. To get a more accurate picture before the park opens next year, the city hired a Charleston, S.C., engineering firm to take a three-dimensional snapshot of objects and soil disturbances up to 10 feet underground using ground-penetrating radar, or GPR.

"It's the Mac Daddy of GPR," said Jorgen Bergstrom, a geophysicist with the firm General Engineering Geophysics LLC. "We can tell the shape and the form of underground objects much better than with standard radar."

Gail Whalen, curator of the Savannah History Museum, said the radar findings will be compared with maps of underground sewer pipes and electrical lines to try to identify any battlefield remnants.

Let's Go Shopping!!

How many times have I heard, "In the 'olden days' people made everything they needed, they didn't have to buy anything." HOGWASH! While malls as we know them did not exist, Front, Water, and Second Streets in Philadelphia may have been the first "strip malls" in America. Eighteenth century shopkeepers offered anything you could possibly wish to buy. So, let's go shopping 18th century style!

First, let us visit the local shops. Nathaniel Newlin operated a store in Concord Township and based on his 1729 estate inventory he offered an extensive range of merchandise. Nathaniel's inventory included a variety of fabric: linens, wool, calico and silk. He offered thimbles, sewing needles, thread and silk ribbons. If you had need of farm equipment or a saddle these were also available. Joseph Trimble, also of Concord Township, offered a vast amount of fabric, among which was Irish Linen, India Calico, and silk taffeta. He also sold stockings and silk and cotton handkerchiefs, silk mitts, and ivory combs. At Joseph's shop you could easily refill your larder with cinnamon, ginger, and sugar; or buy new "potts," and frying pans; or new cutlery and dishes for your table. Should you need to build something he offered hinges, nails, hammers, files, saws and window glass.

But perhaps you were planning on accompanying your husband on a trip to Philadelphia. What could be found in the shops of Philadelphia? Just about anything! In 1750 Joesph Redmond advertised brushes, brooms, maps, tea tables, sauce boats, diamond rings, paintings, china and glassware, toys, perfume, fans and leather gloves. In 1759, James Dundas on Second Street advertised, in addition, to the regular fabrics, velvet, tartan plaid, and "plain, spotted, sprigged and flowergauze." He offered sewing silk, necklaces, and patterns for clothing. At the same time Wharton and Story on Front Street advertised beaver coating and bearskins, damasks, Russia and Irish sheeting, silk bandanas, garters, shoe binding, and "gilt, lacquer, silver fashioned coat and jacket buttons." Writing paper, stockings for men and women, gunpowder and musket balls, knives and pistols, razors, scissors, sewing and knitting needles, ivory combs, snuff boxes and playing cards were also available. Other merchants offered women's bonnets, shoes and shoe buckles, books, soap, candles, dyestuffs, snuff and tobacco, molasses, quills, pewter and china, tea, coffee, chocolate, nutmegs, rum, cordial, furniture, and clocks. You could even purchase a variety of medical treatments such as Bateman Drops, Daffy Elixir and Anderson Pills; what they cured I haven't a clue. You could even purchase capers and anchovies, lemons and oranges!

But there weren't just shops, there were also plenty of service providers within easy walking distance. Shoemakers, Ezekiel Morrell and Alexander Rutherford, plied their trade on Market and Water Streets respectively. Mary Hinshelwood and Lucy McCormick offered their services as mantua makers (seamstresses). Lucy also offered her services as a milliner (hat maker). John Hunter on Front Streets advertised his services as an accountant and as an instructor of "Algebra or any other Part of Mathematicks" There were tailors, printers, silversmiths and goldsmiths, grocers, physicians, bakers, coopers, blacksmiths, cabinetmakers, tinmen, as well as inn and tavern keepers.

Then there is the second hand market. Perhaps you have some items you wish to sell for "ready cash" or purchase a second hand item cheaply. I like a good bargain as well as the next person. For this you could visit the "Friendly Office." Here a variety of items were offered over the years, a feather bed, a silk gown, many different kinds of books, shoes, a clock and more.

For myself, I think I'd like to browse the fabrics and sewing implements, pick up some spices for the larder, and stop by Lucy McCormick's to order a new hat. Oh, and of course I must have some chocolate!
