The Carolina members as mentioned above were joined by Members of the First MD, and the 7<sup>th</sup> VA expanding the attendance for the Southern contingent of the "Line". That brings us up to date as to what went own during the cold of winter. Now to the future.

Charleston, the event that just keeps going and going, has appeared on the radar screen yet again. I was contacted by National Park Service at Ft. Moultrie. It appears that they feel left out of the celebration of the fall of Charleston, and have asked a few of us to come and encamp on the park that weekend. (May 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>) They are bringing one of the 18 pound cannons down from Yorktown and will be firing it during the weekend. Heck that is a thrill in itself. There is a tie in here to not only the Yorktown event, but also to the National Park assistance for the Event at Cowpens in January of 2006, which has already been voted on as a line event for '06. We are going to support these folks in their efforts. However, this is going to be done kinda quietly. There have been enough waves made with the other event there in Charleston, that we are not supporting, so again just us local "southern" folk. However, you folks from VA and MD, certainly had troops there and any of you Arty types who would like to do a little drill, and maybe and I emphasize maybe, get a chance to shoot and 18, the come on down. We have the space and the Park has the enthusiasm so if you want to see Charleston in the spring,

and camp somewhere, where the bugs aren't going to be angry at the intrusion, then "yall come on down now ya hear.

The last weekend in May, that would be Memorial Day Weekend, we have a memorial event, no battle, at a small state park right outside of Charlotte, in SC. That would be at Andrew Jackson State Park. It is in memory of Buford's Massacre by Tarleton's troops. The ceremonies on Sunday will take place at the church site where the wounded were taken, and the final ceremony on Sunday Afternoon at the location of the actual Massacre. The Park and their local supporters are cooking a fish fry for us on Saturday night, and feeding us lunch on Sunday. This should be a really laid back living history only event in remembrance of those who died there. You all are invited, and all that I ask is that you let me know who all can come so I can let them know how many to plan on feeding. And even then that can be a last minute kind of thing.

I'm sure that we all have our own favorite small events across the summer. However, don't forget that we voted to support the event at Camden, SC on the weekend of the 16<sup>th</sup> of August. This will be the celebration of the Battle of Camden, (225<sup>th</sup>) On Sunday morning, early, we are going to be bussed out of town and have the opportunity to actually do a battle on the actual site of the original battle. This property has just been purchased and very little improvement has been done. It is another of those all too rare occasions when we can do a reenactment on the original site at the original time with a 225 year offset. This site will be developed in the future, and you can be sure that regulations will never allow this to be done again. Put this one on your calendar for sure. For more information and to register go to camden225.org. This should be a really big event, and again we have the rare opportunity to actually fire our muskets and do a reenactment on the original site. Please help us with this one.

Lastly I am going to mention the 225<sup>th</sup> of Cowpens. I'm sure that you will be tired of hearing about this one before I get through. Yes it is in January, but January in South Carolina, so here is a chance to get a real jump on the '06 season. Again we are working on the original site. The encampment will be right in the middle of the battlefield. We will literally march across a small two lane country road and do the battles there. More details about that later. Remember this is one of the most studied battles of the war, and we get a chance to do it, in conjunction with NPS, on the actual site. They are bending over backwards to help us with this one. Sutlers on site, full encampment. You Cav guys, lets turn out in way big numbers for this one, it surely had Cav there in numbers at the original. The web site is to be up and running this week on this event. So look for the announcement of the ability to register on the Rev List in the very near future. # Western Department Report – Spring 2005

At this time the Western Department has 2 Full member units: (the 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiments) and one applicant, (the 7<sup>th</sup> Pennsylvania from Minnesota).

There is one 225<sup>th</sup> anniversary event offering; the Battle of Peckuwe, which took place August 8, 1780. Raids against Ruddle's and Martin's Stations in Kentucky prompted Col. George Rogers Clark to lead a force north to stop the attacks at their source. The force consisted of Kentucky militia under Col Logan, and Regulars under Col Harrod, plus a six-pound field gun, about 1000 men in all

The fortified village of Peckuwe, on the Mad River was home to Shawnee, Wyandotte, and Delaware Indians who were lead by Catahecasa (Black Hoof). As Clark's force approached in three divisions, Catahecasa evacuated his noncombatant dependents, and attempted to engage, but was driven into the cabins of the village. Clark set up his field piece on a nearby hill and began to cannonade the fort. As Catahecasa decides to sally out and fight in the open, Clark forms square around his field gun and repulses the attack. Native forces withdraw to the northeast, through a gap in some limestone cliffs so there is no pursuit. Clark orders the village and all crops burned, thus ending the attacks on Kentucky settlements.

The Commemoration will take place July16-17, 2005 at George Rogers Clark Park, Springfield, Ohio, the actual site of the battle. This is an invitational event: all participants must be registered. The battle re-enactment will take place on Sunday at 2:00 PM. with a rehearsal on Saturday. Continental Forces will be under the command of the BAR-NWD, and will only portray troops that were present at the battle.
